Fifth Sunday of Lent - 21st March 2021

Gospel Reading: Today's Gospel is a pivotal moment in John's narrative. Jesus' words about the "coming" of his "hour" mark the end of John's "Book of Signs" and prefaces of "The Book of Glory": the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus.

The Passover is about to begin; many Jews (including some Greek Jews) have arrived in Jerusalem for the festival. Meanwhile, Jesus' conflict with the Jewish establishment has reached the crisis stage. The events of Holy Week are now in motion. Jesus obediently accepts his fate and is prepared for the outcome.

Jesus compares his "glorification" to a grain of wheat that is buried and dies to itself in order to produce the potential life within it. The sacrifice and harvest of the grain of wheat are the fate and glory of anyone who would be Jesus' disciple. The "voice" heard from the sky expresses the unity of Jesus' purpose and God's will.



Reflection: To become the people God calls us to be, to live our lives in the joy of God's love, begins by our "dying" to our doubts and fears, "dying" to our self-centered wants and needs, "dying" to our immaturity and prejudices.

The risk of being hurt is the price of love. That is the challenge of the grain of wheat: only by loving is love returned, only by reaching out and trying do we learn and grow, only by giving to others do we receive, only by dying do we rise to new life.

The Gospel of the grain of wheat is Christ's assurance to us of the great things we can do and the powerful miracles we can work in letting go of our prejudices, fears and ambitions in order to imitate the compassion and love of the crucified Jesus, the Servant Redeemer. connectionsmediaworks.com





Most Rev Anthony Randazzo Bishop of Broken Bay Message

My dear brothers and sisters in Christ, the community of the Church has been present in our part of the world since the early settlers explored the Aboriginal lands to the North of Port Jackson in the late 18th Century. They eventually crossed the Hawkesbury and ventured further North beyond the area that is said to have been named Broken Bay by Captain Cook in 1770.

This year we will celebrate 35 years as the Diocesan family of Broken Bay. Compared to over 200 years of European settlement, and thousands of years of Indigenous life and culture, 35 years sounds miniscule. And of course, chronological timeline, it is. However, our community of the Church is not merely defined by Chronos or chronological time, as a community of disciples of Jesus Christ, we are primarily people of the Lord's time or Kairos. As such, I am delighted to call us together as one community of the Church so that we might reflect upon the past, celebrate the present, and look with hope to the future. This edition of Broken Bay Neighbourhoods has been prepared with our BB35 celebrations in mind. I trust that you will find it informative and that it will be a source of stimulation for hearts and minds committed to the mission Evangelisation as well as enriching our identity as sisters and brothers of our Lord Jesus Christ.

BB35 also incorporates the universal themes of Saint Joseph and the Family, established by Pope Francis for this year. Our BB35 logo, which you will see on flyers and banners throughout the year, draws together the local and universal dimensions of our Catholic community and emphasises that there is one Body of Christ, one Church.

I have been delighted to receive feedback regarding our Broken Bay Lenten program. The feedback has not just been about the content, it has extended also to the positive and inclusive way that people around the diocese have been able to participate. Again, the creative genius of many of our communities has meant that a vast variety of people have connected with each other and with the community of the Church. Thank you to all who have taken up the program as a way of probing the mystery of faith this Lent. I am pleased also that the Lenten #783707v1 program has allowed so many to discover more about the six priorities for our community of the Church that I wrote about in my Pastoral Letter.

The Season of Lent is a marvellous time to discover and rediscover the forgiveness and mercy of God. Our priests have ensured that the sacrament of Reconciliation is available during Lent, and they will be offering opportunities for the sacrament in these weeks leading up to Holy Week. The sacrament of forgiveness is a great

way to prepare for Easter, and I would encourage men and women, young and old, to prepare for and celebrate this sacrament.

Some people, for one reason or another, are so burdened by memories of sin that they lose themselves in the shadows of darkness. The consequence is that they find it difficult or traumatic to approach the sacrament. It can play out in their scrupulosity, and consequently they can repeatedly confess the same sins, always hoping but never really believing in God's merciful love. I would like to offer this short prayer that I have written and hope that it may be of assistance to anyone who carries the burden of fear or sin.

Prayer for Healing of Memory - God, the Father of mercies, with confidence, I pray, that in your love you would heal and purify the memory of my sin. Free me from the distraction of past sin and the burden of guilt, and in your mercy pour your Spirit into my mind and heart so that with dignity I may live life to the full as your (daughter or son). Through Christ Jesus, your Son, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, now and for ages unending. Amen.

Being reconciled to God, to others and with ourselves, is a joy made real in the Holy Spirit. I would like to encourage all members of the faithful, brothers and sisters of the Lord, to approach our celebration of Easter with this joy and with a deep trust and hope in God.

Last Easter we were unable to gather as we normally do for the Paschal Feast. It is my hope that we will be able to gather more 'normally' this year, after last Easter and the Christmas restrictions which we all felt so acutely. By a separate letter I share guidelines as to how best we might enter our liturgies through Holy Week and Easter. We give God thanks for the way in which we have been spared the trauma of so many other places and that the situation is as controlled here as it is. Whilst it is important that we retain our sense of COVID #783707v1 responsibility, it is also important now that we return to a liturgical and pastoral practice as close as possible to 'normal'.

This week is full of important markers and feasts: 500 years of Christianity for the Filipinos, St Patrick's Feast Day, St Joseph's Feast Day. On Friday, 19 March this week, I will be installing and blessing a timber statue of Saint Joseph in our Cathedral. I commissioned this statue as my gift to you and I offer it in memory of my parents, Colin Randazzo and Caterina Di Losa, who are both recently deceased. I hope that you will find the image of Saint Joseph, which will be placed alongside Mother Mary and the child Jesus, a source of spiritual strength and devotion as well as an inspiration for Christian virtue and family life. May these final days of Lent be rich in blessings for you and your families. Saint Joseph, pray for us. +Anthony

The Sacrament of Reconciliation

Thursday 25th March at 7pm @ Manly

Reconciliation (also known as **Confession** or **Penance**) is a sacrament instituted by Jesus Christ in his love and mercy to offer sinners forgiveness for offenses committed against God. In Reconciliation, we acknowledge our sins before God and his Church. We express our sorrow in a meaningful way, receive the forgiveness of Christ and his Church, make reparation for what we have done, and resolve to do better in the future.

An examination of life in preparation for Reconciliation

Love the Lord your God with all your heart

- Do I show reverence and respect for God and the divine name?
- Do I spend adequate time in prayer?
- Do I keep Sunday holy by actively participating in Mass?
- How well do I pray at Mass?
- Do I listen attentively to the readings of the Word of God, respond to them, and take them to heart in a personal way?
- Do I receive Holy Communion reverently, with preparation and thanksgiving?
- Am I sufficiently prepared to take some responsibility in my parish community, whether in the liturgy or in other practical works?
- Do I make a reasonable contribution to my parish each week?

Love one another as I have loved you

- How well do I show my love for the members of my family as parent, spouse, son / daughter, brother / sister?
- Should I do more on my part to listen, to communicate, and to be more open to forgive?
- Do I harbour hurts longer than I should, or use silence and resentment to get my way?
- Am I guilty of anger or violence towards others, whether physically, verbally or in any other way?
- Have I hurt others by lying or criticising, by harshly judging or by holding grudges?
- Do I harbour feelings of racism or other forms of discrimination, and have I ever encouraged others to think, talk or act the same?

Be perfect as your Heavenly Father is perfect

- Am I honest and truthful in my relations with others?
- Have there been times when I have shown arrogance and pride, or used my talents to be hurtful or make others uncomfortable?
- Do I respect my body as the temple of the Holy Spirit, have I respected the gift of sex, or have I given way to my vices and passions?
- Am I careful to discipline my mind in what I see and read, and what I watch on TV or other media?
- Have I been faithful to God's will for me regarding the commitment of marriage and faithful relationship of love? Have there been instances of unfaithfulness?
- How well have I dealt with the sorrows, losses, disappointments and difficulties of my life?

Wherever your treasure is, there will your heart be too

- Have I stolen the property of others, or misused or damaged what does not belong to me?
- Have I been fair and just in my work, either as an employee or as an employer?
- Am I ready to share my possessions, and to give money or assistance to needy people or causes, or do I choose instead to close my heart or find excuses?
- Am I responsible in my use of food and drink, or have I over-indulged because of greed or other reasons?
- Have I taken reasonable care of my own body, looked after myself properly, and tried to maintain a healthy environment?
- Does my use of medications, drugs, cigarettes or alcohol mean possible harm to myself or potentially adverse effects on the lives of those around me?

First Reading

Jeremiah 31:31-34 (JB)

A reading from the prophet Jeremiah

The days are coming when I will make a new covenant with Israel and I will forgive their iniquity.

See, the days are coming - it is the Lord who speaks - when I will make a new covenant with the House of Israel and the House of Judah, but not a covenant like the one I made with their ancestors on the day I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt. They broke that covenant of mine, so I had to show them who was master. It is the Lord who speaks. No, this is the covenant I will make with the House of Israel when those days arrive - it is the Lord who speaks. Deep within them I will plant my Law, writing it on their hearts. Then I will be their God and they shall be my people. There will be no further need for neighbour to try to teach neighbour, or brother to say to brother, 'Learn to know the Lord!' No, they will all know me, the least no less than the greatest - it is the Lord who speaks - since I will forgive their iniquity and never call their sin to mind.

Among those who went up to worship at the festival were some Greeks. These approached Philip, who came from Bethsaida in Galilee, and put this request to him, 'Sir, we should like to see Jesus.' Philip went to tell Andrew, and Andrew and Philip together went to tell Jesus. Jesus replied to them:

'Now the hour has come for the Son of Man to be glorified. I tell you, most solemnly, unless a wheat grain falls on the ground and dies, it remains only a single grain; but if it dies, it yields a rich harvest. Anyone who loves his life loses it; anyone who hates his life in this world will keep it for the eternal life. If a man serves me, he must follow me, wherever I am, my servant will be there too. If anyone serves me, my Father will honour him. Now my soul is troubled. What shall I say: Father, save me from this hour? But it was for this very reason that I have come to this hour. Father, glorify your name!' A voice came from heaven, 'I have glorified it, and I will glorify it again.'

People standing by, who heard this, said it was a clap of thunder; others said, 'It was an angel speaking to him.' Jesus answered, 'It was not for my sake that this voice came, but for yours. 'Now sentence is being passed on this world; now the prince of this world is to be overthrown. And when I am lifted up from the earth, I shall draw all men to myself.'

By these words he indicated the kind of death he would die.
