

### MANLY FRESHWATER CATHOLIC PARISH

Mary Immaculate and St John the Baptist Churches Pentecost Sunday - 23rd May 2021

**Gospel:** Pentecost was the Jewish festival of the harvest (also called the Feast of Weeks), celebrated 50 days after Passover, when the first fruits of the corn harvest were offered to the Lord. A feast of pilgrimage (hence the presence in Jerusalem of so many "devout Jews of every nation"), Pentecost also commemorated Moses' receiving the Law on Mount Sinai. For the new Israel, Pentecost becomes the celebration of the Spirit of God's compassion, peace and forgiveness – the Spirit that transcends the Law and becomes the point of departure for the young Church's universal mission (the planting of a new harvest?).

In his Acts of the Apostles (Reading 1), Luke invokes the First Testament images of wind and fire in his account of the new Church's Pentecost: God frequently revealed his presence in fire (the pillar of fire in the Sinai) and in wind (the wind that sweeps over the earth to make the waters of the Great Flood subside). The Hebrew word for spirit, **ruah**, and the Greek word **pneuma** also refer to the

movement of air, not only as wind, but also of life-giving breath (as in God's creation of man in Genesis 2 and the revivification of the dry bones in Ezekiel 37). Through his life-giving "breath," the Lord begins the era of the new Israel on Pentecost.

Today's Gospel of the first appearance of the Risen Jesus before his ten disciples (remember Thomas is not present) on Easter night is John's version of the Pentecost event. In "breathing" the Holy Spirit upon them, Jesus imitates God's act of creation in Genesis. Just as Adam's life came from God, so the disciples' new life of the Spirit comes from Jesus. In the Resurrection, the Spirit replaces their sense of self-centered fear and confusion with the "peace" of understanding, enthusiasm and joy and shatters all barriers among them to make of them a community of hope and forgiveness. 

# Celebrating 200 years of Catholic Education in Australia

### St Mary's Catholic Primary School, Manly – the oldest Catholic School in the Diocese of Broken Bay

St Mary's School opened in 1881, five years after the establishment of St Mary Immaculate Parish, with Miss Mary Agnes Finn, aged 22, as Principal, and four Sisters of the Good Samaritan as teachers.

Mary Agnes Finn was a pioneering Catholic teacher. Born in Portland, Victoria, she eldest of ten children. Her mother was a Scot and a convert to the faith. They were next-door neighbours of the MacKillop family in Portland, where Mrs Finn was received into the church by Father Julian Tension Woods, with Mary MacKillop as her sponsor. Mrs Finn became a lifelong friend of both Father Woods and Mary MacKillop.

Mary Agnes moved from North Sydney to Randwick with her parents and siblings in 1884, after she resigned from St Mary's, and was actively involved in Randwick parish for the rest of her long life. In 1886 she and her sister were asked open the parish primary school "until provision could be made for a community of nuns". She and her sister "labored at the work until 1892 when the Loreto Sisters took charge" A well-known Catholic writer and poet, she was the first editor of The Annals of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart magazine when it began in 1889. Her obituary noted that "at the time of her death, Miss Finn was the oldest Catholic teacher in the state".

The Sisters of the Good Samaritan had been founded in 1857 by Archbishop Polding along with Sister Scholastica Gibbons, a Sister of Charity. Established to care for homeless women at a refuge in Sydney, and orphans at the Roman Catholic Orphan School at Parramatta, the increasingly urgent need for schools to be established and staffed resulted in education becoming a major focus of the Sisters' work. In 1880 they purchased a large property, then unoccupied and in disrepair, at Manly to provide a home and education for neglected children and young girls. Located on the beach, in 1881 it was blessed as the Star of the Sea Convent. Four years after their arrival in Manly, in 1885, the Sisters took over full responsibility for the parish school in Whistler Street. According to Sister Dorothea Hawley, who was at school at Manly, "in 1885, Sister Mary Laurentia Maher SGS, then a novice, took charge of the primary school, with a postulant who did not persevere. The school was taught in the church, a weatherboard building where the present church stands."

The Catholic community worked hard to build and maintain the school. Towards the end of World War 1, in June 1918 they proudly celebrated the opening of an impressive new two-story building. The ceremony was performed by Archbishop Kelly immediately after the 10 o'clock Mass, in the presence of a very large

gathering of parishioners. In addition to providing a modern, well lighted and ventilated school and hall, the press noted that the building was, from an architectural viewpoint, a distinct adornment to the 'village by the sea.' In the new school, "electric lighting has been installed throughout. The ground floor hall has a specially laid floor of tallow-wood and has been constructed to conform in every respect with the Theatres and Public Halls Act ...The classrooms are arranged in accordance with the latest ideas of the Public Instruction Department, special care being taken with the provision of natural light and ventilation."



1909 The building to the left was the original church. The building to the right is the Parish Church. Initially the old church was used as a school on weekdays and as a church on weekends.

After the Archbishop had performed the blessing a public meeting was held in the new hall. The first speaker was Father McDonald, parish priest: 'We feel proud of this building to-day, because it stands as a monument to our faith, and as witness to our demands for a true and complete Christian education ... to bring up God-fearing citizens." Alderman Heaton, the Mayor of Manly, said that the completion of the new school and hall, was a source of congratulation to all, partly because "Manly had been badly in need of a hall. The Victoria Hall was not an up-to-date hall", and the school hall "was undoubtedly a splendid asset to the seaside town." The Mayor claimed that the school "was a good thing for the community as a whole, inasmuch as there could not be too much co-operation where the education of young Australians was concerned".

Archbishop Kelly also spoke about the 'state aid' issue, which the Catholic community would argue for almost a century, saying that "the Education Department belonged to the Catholics as well as to the others in the community and to the principles of right and justice Catholics were entitled to have a share in the management of it. Catholics appreciated their education system, and they made sacrifices for it. But whilst the public purse maintained other schools, it was only fair that Catholics should be granted similar recognition. If the State salaried any teacher, it should also salary the teacher of every good Australian child."

The conscription debate dominated life in Australia during the final years of the war. The Irish-born Archbishop was keen to display his allegiance and loyalty to the war effort, reminding the community at Manly that "I welcomed the soldiers; I entertained them at Manly; I gave them the tower to be their watch tower before they had prepared other arrangements. I went to them at dinner, and gave them all the encouragement and approval that I had ... We have sent forty or fifty priests to the front as chaplains."

World War II also challenged the school community at Manly. Sister Mary Pascaline (Anne) Crowe, who died in 2017 aged just over 100 years, was on the St Mary's staff as a young nun during the war years, having arrived from the Mother House at Glebe in 1940. She recollected her time at Manly forty years later. The Principal was Sister Mary Audeon Dalton, who "in her forthright way filled in many gaps between the theory and practice of teaching. Then came Sister Mary Magdalena Fletcher whose gentle ways rounded off my training. I am very grateful to them both." In 1942 Sister Pascaline became Principal "much to the consternation" of the parish priest, although they developed a very happy professional partnership. Manly, on the harbour, was vulnerable during the war, and Sister was required to attend a one-day training course at Cusa House on air raid precautions: "six days crammed into one. Thank God we did not ever have our knowledge tested in a real-life situation!" Although she did remember the night the nuns spent in the convent corridor "while the depth charges destroyed the Jap. submarines in the harbour."

In preparation for Archbishop Gilroy's first official visit to St Mary's school, for confirmation, the parish priest had employed workmen to give a 'facelift' to the interior of the church. A final check of the ceiling resulted in a bird's nest catching fire, and nothing could save the roof. "Soldiers from a nearby camp rescued the tabernacle" and three weeks later confirmation was held in the school hall. Every student required a sponsor, and the Christian Brothers filled in where they were short ... "some (Brothers) had to make two or three trips to the stage".

Since the beginning, lay teachers have played an important part in providing quality Catholic education at Manly. Remembering the period of World War II, Sister Pascaline said "I would like to pay tribute to Mrs Peters who came as a lay teacher at 10/- a week. For many years she gave invaluable service to St Mary's. I trust that as financial circumstances improved, so did her salary!"

In July 1992, St Mary's school prepared to return to lay leadership. Sister Clare Condon, Province Counsellor, announced that, after ten years as Principal at Manly, Sister Mary Bernadette McDonnell SGS would not continue in 1993. At that time, fifteen lay members of the school staff signed a letter "with love" expressing their "sadness at the decision which has been made to withdraw a Good Samaritan Sister from the Principalship of the school". Sister Clare noted that the "school has an excellent record and tradition of Catholic education which can be taken forward by the (Broken Bay) Catholic Schools Office."

St. Mary's has grown from approximately 135 students at the start of 1997 to its current enrolment of 303. In 2021, St. Mary's continues to provide Catholic education to the young people of Manly and strives to be an innovative and inspirational Catholic Community School that celebrates the journey of faith and learning the school community makes in relationship with all creation. Creative school liturgies, parish based

sacramental programs, a regular Family Mass/BBQ and monthly children's liturgy on the weekend are but some of the ways that families are invited to become involved in their local faith community.

Manly provides an extremely cosmopolitan environment for a Catholic primary school and this is reflected in the energy and spontaneity which the children bring to their learning. The families come from a broad range of socio-cultural and economic backgrounds. About 8-10% of students come from an ESL background whilst other students may experience some form of learning delay. The pastoral care and wellbeing of students, staff and families is an important part of life at the school.

The current principal, Mr Paul McGuire, was appointed in 2013, the 25th person to hold the leadership role. In recent years, the professional learning of the staff has focused predominantly upon Literacy and Numeracy with a view to establishing more consistent 'best practice' from K-6, and to implement the Extending Mathematical Understanding (EMU) program and explore new approaches to assessment and data analysis. The school has worked with Education Officers from the Broken Bay Catholic Schools Office, and the school leadership team has participated in and led professional learning on areas such as ongoing conversations about student learning, open to learning conversations and leaders learning walks.

Teachers are encouraged to adopt a collegial approach to their professional work. Features such as team teaching, learning centres, personal learning contracts, group work, three-way reporting and self/peer assessment characterise the 'lived curriculum' of St. Mary's. Teachers from the school have travelled to Cambodia during school holidays in recent years on numerous occasions to lead short courses on teaching/learning in literacy and numeracy for very large numbers of village teachers.

St Mary's school is part of the Broken Bay Diocese Peninsula Learning Community of Catholic Schools and staff members regularly participate in a range of professional learning events with colleagues from neighbouring Catholic schools, including, for example, Literacy and Numeracy Networks, Kindergarten Network, Sport, public speaking, debating, and music.

The buildings on either side of the St Mary's Church are both now occupied by St Mary's Primary School. Over the years, the building interiors have undergone extensive renovations. The old Christian Brothers High School building in particular, is now home to four senior classrooms, an exciting new media room and modern library.

St Mary's Catholic School, Manly, is very much a family values-based Catholic community primary school, with a rich and diverse history of guiding young students, in partnership with families, as well as the church. The culture is built upon positive relationships and a commitment to serve others and our world.

### First Reading

Acts 2:1-11 (JB)

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles

They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak different languages.

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech.

Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome - Jews and proselytes alike - Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

always carry out your good intentions. If you are led by the Spirit, no law can touch you. When selfindulgence is at work the results are obvious: fornication, aross indecency and irresponsibility; idolatry and sorcery; feuds and wrangling, jealousy, bad temper and quarrels; disagreements, factions, envy; drunkenness, orgies and similar things. I warn you now, as I warned you before: those who behave like this will not inherit the kingdom of God. What the Spirit brings is very different: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, trustfulness, gentleness and self-control. There can be no law against things like that, of course. You cannot belong to Christ Jesus unless you crucify all self-indulgent passions and desire.

Since the Spirit is our life, let us be directed by the Spirit.


