

THE MOST HOLY TRINITY SUNDAY - 7th June 2020

Dear Friends,

I hope you are all well and keeping warm in this chilly weather. As we rejoice that fifty of us can now gather for Sunday and Weekday Masses, I am very aware that many of you are still struggling with poor health, isolation, employment and financial problems and family or relationship problems. Please let me and our wonderful parish staff know if there is anything we can do for you or for others who are experiencing real difficulties.

In our constantly changing world many of us often experience frustration and uncertainty. We feel left out or forgotten, even sometimes by God. We also know that generosity given can result in generosity received, and just when we need it. This Sunday's great Feast of the Most Holy Trinity helps us to understand the generosity of God towards us.



There is a beautiful Russian icon of the Blessed Trinity painted by a monk by the name of Anton Rublev. It depicts the three Divine Persons sitting at a table. A dish of food lies on the table. But the thing that immediately strikes you is the fact that at the front of the table there is a vacant place. The vacant place is meant to convey openness, hospitality, and welcome towards the stranger and outsider.

That vacant place is meant for each of us, and for all the human family. It signifies God's invitation to us to share in the life of the Trinity. God doesn't exclude us. He doesn't talk to us at the doorstep. He invites us to come in and sit at his table. He wants to share his life with us. In the words of the Gospel for this feast: 'God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son...'

Many are intimated by the great mystery of the Blessed Trinity. This is a pity. We should see the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit as friends to whom we can relate, and to whom we can talk in prayer. Because God's Son, Jesus, befriended us, we are no longer strangers and outsiders. We are God's children. We are part of the family.

He has already given us a place at the banquet of earthly life. But he wants us to have a place at the banquet of eternal life too. Only at God's table can we find the nourishment our hearts are hungering for.

From all this we see that God is a God of love. Our response can only be one of trust in God and love towards one another. What St Paul said to the Corinthians is meant also for us: 'Help one another. Be united; live in peace, and the God of love and peace will be with you.'

GOSPEL REFLECTION

One God, three persons united in a constant flow of love!

On this feast of the Most Holy Trinity, we are all

invited to be drawn deeper into the rhythm of this eternal dance of love.


Moses met God in the form of a cloud **(First Reading).** God revealed the foundational truth that underlies the commandments Moses was carrying: the Lord is compassion and tenderness, slow to anger and rich in kindness.

The **Psalm** from the Book of Daniel is an excerpt from a joyful song of praise, attributed to three men whose faith had saved them from a fiery furnace.

In Paul's letter (**Second Reading**) we hear how the early Christian community were encouraged to embody this Trinitarian loving relationship, in how they lived and greeted one another. As we consider the restrictions we have been living under, may we truly value and cherish our bonds of friendship.

In John's **Gospel**, Jesus reveals to Nicodemus the depth of God's love for all people. God sent his Son so that all may have eternal life. God in Jesus became fully human and lived as one of us, physically living out the compassion and mercy revealed to Moses centuries before.

At Pentecost, the Spirit of God was poured into the hearts of Jesus's followers. This same Spirit of love unites us now as we pray, whether we do so alone, in a group, or in a virtual gathering. May the grace of the Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with us all. Pathways to God 2020

The Discernment papers from the Writing and Discernment Groups are now published, encompassing everything said from the 1st (Listening and Dialogue) and ongoing 2nd (Listening and Discernment) phases of the Plenary Council. As the nation continues to recover we ask the Holy Spirit to continue to inflame the passion we feel in proclaiming the gospel and to remind us to keep our ears, eyes and heart open to those around us who are most in need.

HOW IS GOD CALLING US TO BE A CHRIST-CENTRED CHURCH IN AUSTRALIA THAT IS **Missionary & Evangelising?**

'Mission' is God's initiative and proceeds from the Trinity, whose love overflows in creation and

redemption. The Word and Spirit are present and active in the unfolding of the universe and in all human history, as evidenced in the goodness and truth found in all cultures and societies. The incarnate Son of God through his life, ministry, death and resurrection revealed God to us and redeemed us in a unique and unsurpassable way through his paschal sacrifice. His evangelising activity gave birth to the Church which is the visible manifestation of the Gospel command to "Go, therefore, make disciples of all the nations" (Mt 28:19).

The Church, founded by Jesus Christ, is a forum of welcome to "the great multitude from every tribe, tongue and nation". This biblical

image invites us to imagine anew the ways in which the diversity of unique gifts can contribute to an organic and authentic common building of the Church. This is especially crucial in Australia, where the Church is manifest in the great multitude of ecclesial expressions from East and West. The words that St John Paul II spoke particularly to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples may be applied to all Catholics in Australia: "the Church herself in Australia will not be fully the Church that Jesus wants her to be until you have made your contribution to her life and until that contribution has been joyfully received by others."

The Listening and Dialogue responses revealed the deep faith, integrity and sincerity of all the people who gave of themselves in their

They demonstrated a commitment to living the gospel of Christ and sharing the gospel with others, even in the midst of a largely secular

culture. They expressed a love for the community of the Church, despite the well-documented failings of members of the community. They showed a desire to be a Christ-centred Church that is prayerful and Eucharistic.

On Holy Thursday 2018, Pope Francis celebrated the Mass of the Last Supper in the Regina Coeli Prison in Rome. During the Mass,

the Holy Father washed the feet of 12 prison inmates from different cultural and faith backgrounds. Pope Francis was not concerned with their crimes, their religion, their race or their sexual orientation. After kneeling before each one, washing and kissing their feet, Pope Francis said to them, "I am a sinner like you. But I represent Jesus today...This is service. This is Jesus. Before giving us himself in his body and blood, Jesus risked himself for each one of us — risked himself in service — because he loves us so much."

Australia has been blessed with great natural beauty, an abundance of resources, democracy, peace and prosperity. It is a land that prizes freedom, equality and egalitarianism, a 'fair go' and mateship. However, mental illness, sickness, loneliness, family or financial pressures afflict many Australians. Many lack the hope and joy that are features of a good life. Fear of the future and a distrust of institutional authority are part of the social reality for significant numbers. Climate change is making extreme the Australian cycles of drought, fire and flood, threatening lives, homes and livelihoods.

HOW IS GOD CALLING US TO BE A CHRIST-CENTRED CHURCH IN AUSTRALIA THAT IS **Open to Conversion, Renewal and Reform?**

The "call to conversion" is "the indispensable condition of Christian love." (TMA 50)

Christians respond to this call when they openly acknowledge personal and communal failings and experience the joy of reconciliation shaped by renewed relationship with the Trinitarian God. Ongoing conversion is the source of renewal and of authentic reform. Catholics in Australia experience the riches of the Church's traditions, through liturgy, parish life and the Church's contributions to welfare, education and healthcare. At the same time, they acknowledge hindrances to personal and institutional conversion toward Christ. The Report repeatedly refers to the Church's rites of reconciliation (particularly the Third Rite), indicating that the Church in Australia needs to respond to this desire for formation in, and access to, sacramental reconciliation.

TRINITY SUNDAY A DOMESTIC REFLECTION

"God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life." John 3: 16-18

Good parent, uncool parent, beloved parent

A mom and dad welcome their child into the world. For the newborn, Mom and Dad are the source of all life and love — complete and total, unconditional and unlimited. Mom and Dad are powerful figures of order and stability to the child.

But as the child begins to struggle to stand up, to walk and run on his or her own, to form words and express ideas, Mom and Dad become teachers and guides — the child learns what he or she should and should not do. By the time the child reaches his or her teens, the relationship with Mom and Dad becomes strained, as the son or daughter enters adulthood and begins to rebel against the limits set by Mom and Dad.

And then the child comes into his or her own as an adult and takes responsibility for his or her own life. The adult son or daughter becomes a Mom and Dad — and, with a child of their own, they realize all that their Mom and Dad did for them — and why. And they seek to provide the same for their newborn.

When Mom or Dad dies, the son or daughter will hear someone say to them, "Your Dad would be very proud of you" or "That's exactly what your Mom would do."

And the child-now-adult-now parent realizes that all that they have are gifts from their parents.

The love that we experience growing up mirrors the unique love of God, who is Father, Son and Spirit. In the image of the Trinity, we realize the many ways we experience that love in our lives: God the Father who breathes life into us as well as the wonder of all creation; God the Son who teaches us how to live that life meaningfully and purposefully; God the Spirit, the wisdom of God that inspires us, with gratitude and humility, to be the means of the love that binds us as brothers and sisters to one another.

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
