Understanding the Word Moral life flows from the Beatitudes

There is a connection between last Sunday's Beatitudes and this Sunday's moral teachings. The last of the Beatitudes had pronounced this blessing: 'Blessed are you when people hate you, and when they exclude and insult you, and denounce your name as evil on account of the Son of Man' [6:22]. This Sunday's passage begins by prescribing a disciple's response to such abuse: 'love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who mistreat you' [6:27]. The two passages are similarly structured and the verbs are perfectly paired: hate/love, exclude/do good, insult/bless, denounce/pray. Clearly such an extraordinary response to abuse is possible only because disciples are blessed: their strength for good comes from God.

The passage continues with four specific examples of a disciple's response to maltreatment from enemies. Then Luke summarises the teaching to this point by the 'Golden Rule': 'Do to others as you would have them do to you' [6:31]. Matthew, too, has this saying in his Sermon on the Mount [7:12] but later and in

Matthew, too, has this saying in his Sermon on the Mount [7:12] but later and in a different collection of sayings. Luke's insertion of the saying here strengthens the impact and sharpens the demand: in context, 'the others' whom disciples are to treat kindly are enemies and persecutors!

After three questions about conduct toward one's enemies, the benefits of discipleship are declared. First, disciples will receive a great reward; moreover, they will be children of God. As Luke explains, God loves the ungrateful and the wicked (this is why Jesus came!); similarly, God's children should do as their 'Father'. The implication is clear: in this sermon instructing disciples, the comparison between Father and children parallels the relationship between Master and disciples. In both cases the values of the greater (Father, Master) are the moral norms of the lesser (children, disciples). Ultimately, the Golden Rule is surpassed: more than doing as you would have done, disciples are to do as God would do - 'Be merciful as God is merciful'. Disciples have been blessed with mercy so they are to act with mercy. Moral life flows from blessing.
