# REFLECTION 24TH OCTOBER Mk 10:46-52

Reproduced from God's Word 2021: Daily Reflections, published by St Pauls Publications, Strathfield

What do you want me to do for you? What would I reply if Jesus asked me this question right now? The blind man not only knew what he wanted Jesus to do for him, he had no doubt that he would get what he wanted! This is a story about hope born of deep faith.

Bartimaeus had such hope-a deep certainty that this 'Son of David' he had heard so much about would have pity on him and restore his sight. The people around him didn't have quite the same certainty; instead they tried to keep him quiet. Bartimaeus was so certain of a cure that he threw his cloak off as he went to Jesus. If he'd had any doubt surely he would have clung onto his precious possession in case he couldn't find it again. Bartimaeus had hoped to see for so long and now he knew his time had come.

Jesus, increase my faith that I will be able to see what you do for me. May I be able to say with the psalmist: 'The Lord has done great things for me; I am filled with joy!

## WE HAVE WONDERFUL NEWS!!!

It is with great joy we can announce, Bishop Anthony has advised our churches can be open to the public for Mass and Adoration, regardless of vaccination status, St Cecilia's and St John Fisher will resume Mass from Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> October.

(there is no need to book in for mass)

Places of Public Worship are exempt from the requirement of vaccination. Given that both vaccinated and unvaccinated may be present at Masses it will be important for us to convey to our people that they need to discern what may be in the best interests of their safety and that of their families.

In resuming Masses, it will be important for us to follow all COVID safety requirements around density of gatherings, QR registration, the wearing of masks and refraining from congregational singing. The government regulations do allow for a small choir of up to 10 people. We continue to celebrate Mass in the way that we have since the commencement of the pandemic, mindful of the many ways by which we ensure everyone's safety. The Chancery will continue to communicate with the parish on changes and requirements as they emerge.

It is important to be mindful that the status of vaccination does apply to facilities other than our churches, such as offices, meeting rooms and schools. In these locations, until further notification people who are not double vaccinated will not be allowed into locations other than the church for Public Worship.

## Update from Bishop Anthony Randazzo regarding NSW Government "Roadmap" & implications for Diocese

From the Tuesday 19/10/21, public Masses will resume for all, regardless of vaccination status of people who attend Church, or who undertake a ministry.

- a. Other rituals such as Baptisms and other services of prayer and devotion may resume, including Reconciliation.
- b. The number of people who can attend Mass and other liturgies and services of prayer is based on the 4sqm principle, including for funerals and weddings. Based on this, St Cecilia's church can permit 45 people and St John Fisher hall can permit 100 people to these services.
- c. Congregational singing will not be possible, but a musician and cantor are permitted.
- d. Those who wish to receive Holy Communion on the tongue should wait until the end of the Communion Procession.
- e. The sign of Peace should only be given by a simple bow or nod of the head.

#### 3. From 1 December 2021

- a. One person per 2sqm for indoor and outdoor gatherings will apply. Therefore St Cecilia's church can permit 90 people to gather and St John Fisher hall can permit 200.
- b. Congregational singing will be permitted.
- c. No restriction on the use of other parish facilities.
- 4. It is essential that anyone visiting our churches use the QR code to register their visit, sanitize, and always wear a mask.



When he heard that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to shout and to say, 'Son of David, Jesus, have pity on me.' And many of them scolded him and told him to keep quiet, but he only shouted all the louder, 'Son of David, have pity on me.' Jesus stopped and said, 'Call him here.' So they called the blind man. 'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.

# **SOCIAL JUSTICE**

### **Cry of the Earth**

How can we make the biggest difference on our Earth? Tweaking three parts of our life (Home, Transport and Food) will make the biggest difference.

### **Transport**

If you drive a traditional petrol or diesel vehicle, try to reduce the amount of time your engine <u>idles</u>. Research last year found Australian motorists are likely to idle more than 20% of the time they're driving. If idling was eliminated from all journeys, the emissions saved would equal that of removing up to 1.6 million cars from the road.

While some idling is unavoidable such as when stopped at traffic lights, drivers can turn their engines off while parked and waiting in their vehicle.

And drive smoothly, not aggressively. Driving with limited acceleration and braking has been <u>found</u> to significantly reduce emissions.

You might be thinking of making your next car an electric vehicle. While the cost of electric vehicles has traditionally been prohibitive for many people, the technology is <u>expected to reach</u> price parity with conventional cars in Australia in the next few years. And these days, you can even get a good second-hand deal.

There's a lot of misinformation out there about whether electric cars are a good choice for the planet. So where does the truth lie?

It's true that electricity used to charge an electric vehicle's battery is often sourced from fossil fuels. And energy is still required to make an electric vehicle - in particular, the battery However, last year, <u>research found</u> in 95% of the world, electric vehicles were less emissions-intensive than traditional cars over their full life cycle – even accounting for the current emissions intensity of electricity generation.

If you buy an electric vehicle, it's important to ensure potential emissions savings are realised. One way of doing this is by recharging during the middle of the day when renewable electricity is most abundant. And don't forget, as renewable energy forms an ever-increasing share of the electricity mix, the climate benefits of electric vehicles become even greater.

And of course, don't forget about the obvious low- or zero-emission ways to get around: walking, cycling, catching public transport and carpooling.

#### Food

<u>Research</u> earlier this year showed food systems are responsible for a third of human-caused greenhouse gas emissions. And <u>recent studies show</u> even if the world stopped burning fossil fuels immediately, emissions from the global food system could still push global temperatures over the 1.5°C warming threshold.

Reducing meat consumption is a well-known way to cut your carbon footprint. In fact, recent research from Sweden showed just how high emissions from meat and dairy products are, compared with substitute products. It found:

- lamb is 25 times more polluting than tofu
- milk is five times as polluting as oat drink
- dairy-based cheese is four times as polluting as vegan cheese.

In Australia, the range of meat alternatives is growing quickly. In just one example, Sydney-based All G Foods is developing plant-based mince, sausages, chicken and bacon, as well as "cow-free" dairy products. Helped along by \$5 million in federal government funding, the company's first product launches this month.

Another food that promises to help cut your carbon footprint is seaweed. Australia is only just <u>catching on</u> to the benefits of commercial seaweed production, which can be grown with few environmental costs.

Australia's first factory manufacturing food-grade seaweed products <u>opened</u> in New South Wales last year. It has the capacity to put seaweed into pastas, and even muesli!

# Reduce, reuse, inspire

Reducing your climate footprint is not just about buying "green" stuff: it's also about avoiding consumption in the first place. So try to buy less – and if you can't avoid it, try and buy second-hand.

You never know, you might start a revolution. <u>Evidence suggests</u> people who observe their peers undertaking environmentally friendly behaviour often adopt similar actions.

Homily given by Bishop Anthony Randazzo Bishop of Broken Bay Homily for the Ordination to the Priesthood Deacons Rogelio Delmonte, Aldrin Valdehueza, Samuel French Feast of Saint Luke Our Lady of the Rosary Cathedral 18 October 2021

In the Christian Tradition it is agreed that the third Gospel account was written by Saint Luke, whose feast we commemorate today. Tradition also ascribes Antioch in Syria as the birthplace of this physician, come missionary, come evangelist. A follower of Saint Paul, Luke accompanied the great Apostle on his missionary journeys to Philippi, Jerusalem, as well as being Paul's companion during his second imprisonment in Rome.

Luke did not know Jesus in the flesh, nor was he an eyewitness to the preaching of Christ. His encounter was with the Risen Lord through the power of the Holy Spirit and the testimony of women and men in the early Christian community. Inspired by these witnesses, he penned the Gospel and recorded the Acts of the Apostles.

Saint Luke's purpose in writing was that we might know the "truth" concerning the faith: the Good News of Jesus Christ, and the movement of the Holy Spirit working in and through the living members of Christ's Body, the Church (cf. Dei Verbum, 19).

The Roman Martyrology recalls Luke as one "who suffered much for the name of Christ and died filled with the Holy Spirit" (RM 18 October, p.227).

Rogelio, Aldrin and Samuel, the life and work of Saint Luke provides for you a marvellous inspiration for your life and ministry as priests. He sums up the priestly vocation most eloquently in the words of Jesus, "whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me" (Luke 9:23). By placing the cross of Christ at the centre of your life, you will be sure to begin and end each day with the Lord Jesus, who is the Alpha and Omega, our beginning and our end (cf Rev 1:8).

The prophet Isaiah, whom we have heard this morning, recalls for us the words that Jesus would claim as his own at the beginning of his public ministry, "The Spirit of the Lord has been given to me" (cf Isaiah 61: 1; Luke 4:18). I invite you to make these words your own today as the mark of your priesthood. The Spirit animates you for mission, which will draw you to the heart of the community and urge you to go to the periphery. The Good News that you will proclaim is for the poor and the broken hearted.

Your ministry will be one of joyful proclamation of freedom from sin and all that diminishes the dignity of the human person. As priests you are commissioned in the Spirit to liberate women and men who are incarcerated because of crimes against society and sins against God.

Most importantly, as disciples of the Lord and priests of God the Most High, you will comfort God's Holy People by accompanying them in the faith, by nourishing them with the sacraments, by preaching and teaching with integrity and fidelity, and by praying for them without ceasing.

Do not be discouraged by the prophets of doom who have no hope in the Good News of Jesus Christ, who reject faith and reason, who propose the culture of death, who abandon the vulnerable, the sick, and the poor.

Your priestly ministry will be to take the lead through dialogue with the world. The community of the Church in the 21st century must have humble, faithful, dedicated priests to share in the mission of proclaiming God's Kingdom – the Truth that God reigns.

The Fathers of the Second Vatican Council remind us that the common vocation for the Christian people is the universal call to holiness (cf Lumen gentium, 40). The holiness of the people must be your criterion of life and pastoral action. In the words of Saint John Paul II, "This means proposing a high standard of ordinary Christian life without giving in to mediocrity" (JPII, Novo Millennio Inuente, 31).

Pastoral action requires renewed efforts, creativity, and joy to be more effective and proactive in meeting people in the Spirit of Christ. Engaging the world in this space will be your life's work as priests. It must be undertaken carefully with compassion; you must engage this work intelligently and humbly. Never allow your enthusiasm for the Truth of the Gospel to become a burden for others on the journey of faith. My sons, in the words of the Gospel, "let your first words be, 'Peace to this house'"(Luke 10:5).

Remember too, that this work does not belong to you or me. It is God's work. As priests, you are ordained to be co-workers – but the work always belongs to God.

Finally, Roger, Aldrin, and Sam, as you enter the Order of the Priesthood, I offer you Saint Luke as your heavenly patron. Saint Paul provides a wonderful insight into the character of the holy Evangelist. When all had abandoned him, he declares, "only Luke is with me" (2Tim 4:11). Luke is steadfast and he is faithful. When the chips are down, he does not run away, or abandon his co-worker, or neglect the community of believers. Instead, he unites himself more closely to the life and mission of proclaiming the Good News of Jesus Christ. Let this be your model of priestly life and service. And let the fidelity and mercy of God accompany you.

As you now put on the Priesthood of Christ, may Mary, the Mother of God, intercede for you as you declare yourself ready to follow Jesus her Son through Calvary to glory.

The Spirit of the Lord is upon you. May God keep you strong in faith and generous in love, for the glory of God and for the sake of God's holy people. Amen

In March 2020, Pope Francis announced that the theme for the XVI Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops would be "For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation and Mission".

The actual Synod of Bishops gathering will be held in October 2023, however, the journey towards its celebration begins this month. Pope Francis opened the Synod on 9-10 October 2021 in Rome, and the Synod opened for each particular Church around the world on 17 October 2021.

This 2-year process allows a period of wide consultation and walking together as a worldwide Church: "It is precisely this path of synodality which God expects of the Church of the third millennium. This journey, which follows in the wake of the Church's "renewal" proposed by the Second Vatican Council, is both a gift and a task: by journeying together and reflecting together on the journey that has been made, the Church will be able to learn through Her experience which processes can help Her to live communion, to achieve participation, to open Herself to mission. Our "journeying together" is, in fact, what most effectively enacts and manifests the nature of the Church as the pilgrim and missionary People of God."
