Gospel Reflection for 14th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Besides the twelve apostles whom Jesus commissions to preach to the lost sheep of the house of Israel, he also appoints another group of disciples who would be sent later to preach to pagan nations. There is discrepancy in the number of disciples: some say seventy while other translations put their number at seventy-two.

The number of people who assisted Moses in administration (Num 11: 16-25) was said to number seventy. Two other persons are later added to Moses' company (Num 11:26-30). Accordingly, seventy-two also refers to the seventy-two grandsons of Noah, who left their homesteads and scattered all over the world. This group of disciples would become the progenitors of different peoples in the whole world.

Jesus will send the disciples on mission after his ascension into heaven. In the meantime, he is preparing these men by engaging them in a practicum or first training exercise. They are to set out on a mission of peace, offering peace to every household and open to receive peace in return. They are called to witness to their trust in divine providence, not loading their mission with material possessions nor getting anxious about personal comfort. They must learn contentment, remaining in their mission field and not shopping around for more comfortable lodgings.

The disciples are full of joy upon their return from their first experience of being missionaries. They even witnessed the overthrow of the powers of evil. Jesus spends time listening to their success stories and he shares with the disciples their exhilaration and joy. Later, Jesus will lift up to his heavenly Father this great experience of joy he experienced with his disciples.

Lest his disciples start to gloat with pride and self-importance, Jesus re-directs their joy, not in their missionary accomplishments but in the assurance of their place in the reign of God. They have to be reminded how pride is the parent sin, and how Lucifer himself was thrown out of paradise because of his sinful pride.

It is very tempting to read the commissioning of seventy-disciples as a page from the past, and nothing more. Their story reminds us how all baptized Christians belong to the long unbroken chain of disciples called to continue the mission entrusted to us by Jesus Christ. We are challenged to move out of our comfort zones and realise that all Christians are essentially missionaries.
