He instructed them to take nothing for the journey but a walking stick—no food, no sack, no money in their belts. (Gospel)

Dear Parishioners,

Amos was a herdsman and a dresser of sycamore trees with no prophetic lineage or

experience. He preached against the injustice and oppression of the poor by the rich and powerful class. Amazia, the priest of Bethel, asks him to stop preaching and go away. In reply Amos admits his lack of professional qualifications but insists that his call ' to go and prophesy' comes from God. He will not stop speaking the word God gives him to speak.

In the Gospel Jesus summons the twelve apostles and sends them out with a mandate to preach, to heal and to drive out evil spirits. They were mostly uneducated fisher folk. Like Amos, their authority to preach was not based on their qualifications but on the divine calling they received through Jesus. This calling made them ambassadors of God, acting on God's behalf. They had to face challenges and opposition. Yet their mission was amazingly successful because they trusted in the one who called and sent them. They remained faithful to their divine calling regardless of opposition. The secret of their success is explained by Saint Paul, in his Christological hymn of blessing in today's second reading: 'Blessed be God the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ...[who] chose us in Christ before the world was made to be holy and spotless, and to live through love in his presence.'

NAIDOC Week

Celebrations have been held across Australia this week to celebrate the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

Maggie-Jean Douglas - a Gubbi Gubbi artist from South East Queensland – was the 2021 winner of the National NAIDOC Poster Competition. Her entry – *Care For Country* was chosen from 260 entries. The 21-year-old artist said her first thoughts on hearing the 2021 NAIDOC theme *'Heal Country*' was about how country has cared for and healed First Nations people in all senses of the meaning for so long.

"I wanted to create an artwork that told that story and made me hopeful for what's to come in future years," she said.

"When creating Care for Country I kept in mind that this meant spiritually, physically, emotionally, socially and culturally."

"I chose to create a bright and vibrant artwork that included the different colours of the land but showed how they come together in our beautiful country and to make people feel hopeful for the future."

"I've included communities/people, animals and bush medicines spread over different landscapes of red dirt, green grass, bush land and coastal areas to tell the story of the many ways country can and has healed us throughout our lives and journeys."

First Reading

From the from the prophet Amos Am 7:12-15

Go, prophesy to my people.

Amaziah, the priest of Bethel, said to Amos, 'Go away, seer; get back to the land of Judah; earn your bread there, do your prophesying there. We want no more prophesying in Bethel; this is the royal sanctuary, the national temple.' 'I was no prophet, neither did I belong to any of the brotherhoods of prophets.' Amos replied to Amaziah, 'I was a shepherd, and looked after sycamores: but it was the Lord who took me from herding the flock, and the Lord who said, "Go, prophesy to my people Israel."' Before the world was made, he chose us, chose us in Christ, to be holy and spotless, and to live through love in his presence, determined that we should become his adopted sons, through Jesus Christ for his own kind purposes, to make us praise the glory of his grace, his free gift to us in the Beloved in whom, through his blood, we gain our freedom, the forgiveness of our sins. Such is the richness of the grace which he has showered on us in all wisdom and insight. He has let us know the mystery of his purpose, the hidden plan he so kindly made in Christ from the beginning to act upon when the times had run their course to the end:

that he would bring everything together under Christ, as head, everything in the heavens and everything on earth. And it is in him that we were claimed as God's own, chosen from the beginning, under the predetermined plan of the one who guides all things as he decides by his own will; chosen to be, for his greater glory, the people who would put their hopes in Christ before he came. Now you too, in him, have heard the message of the truth and the good news of your salvation, and have believed it: and you have been stamped with the seal of the Holy Spirit of the Promise, the pledge of our inheritance which brings freedom for those whom God has taken for his own, to make his glory praised. From the holy Gospel according to Mark Mk 6:7-13

He called the Twelve, and began to send them out. Jesus summoned the Twelve and began to send them out in pairs giving them authority over the unclean spirits. And he instructed them to take nothing for the journey except a staff – no bread, no haversack, no coppers for their purses. They were to wear sandals, but, he added, 'Do not take a spare tunic.' And he said to them, 'If you enter a house anywhere, stay there until you leave the district. And if any place does not welcome you and people refuse to listen to you, as you walk away shake off the dust from under your feet as a sign to them.' So they set off to preach repentance; and they cast out many devils, and anointed many sick people with oil and cured them. The Gospel of the Lord.
