Dear Parishioners,

Walking northwards towards Caesarea Philippi, Jesus asked his disciples a question which continues to resonate through the ages: 'Who do people say I am?'

If we are serious in proclaiming our Christian faith, it is a question to which we must provide a sincere personal response not only in a creedal statement but also in the manner of our daily life. Jesus was probably well aware of the negative terms with which his enemies described him. To them he was a blasphemer, a false prophet, a law-breaker, a glutton and drunkard and even a madman. Others saw him more positively as John the Baptist or Elijah. Both to the blind man at Bethsaida (John 9) and to the Samaritan woman at Jacob's Well (John 4), he was a prophet. Jesus answered his own question in a series of seven 'I am' statements in John's Gospel in which he claimed to be: the bread of life, the light of the world, the door of the sheepfold, the good shepherd, the resurrection and the life, and the way and the truth and the life.

In responding the Jesus' question today and seeking our own true identity, we might also ask Jesus, 'Who do you say I am?'

Planned Giving Review Thank You

Thank you for your care and concern, understanding and support.

Fr Greg and the Parish Finance Committee wish to thank all Parishioners who received our phone calls over recent weeks in regard to the Planned Giving Review. As indicated in previous Parish eNews, with the closure of our Church due to Covid-19 restrictions a request was put to Parishioners who (prior to lockdown) had been making cash contributions to the Planned Giving Program, to wherever possible, convert to contributing via an Electronic Funds Transfer.

Our team of phone callers were very encouraged by the reaction of the Parishioners who were contacted. These Parishioners expressed their care and concern for the wellbeing of our Priests and understood that the financial needs of the Parish continue regardless of Covid lockdowns.

Additionally, to date **48** Parishioners have indicated that they have, or will change the way they will contribute to the Parish (2nd Collection/Envelopes) and Priests (1st Collection) from 'cash' to "Electronic Funds Transfer" or Credit Card.

While we understand that some people, for various reasons, prefer to continue with the 'cash' payment method, we appreciate the ongoing desire to support the Parish and Priests by way of cash contributions.

The job is not yet complete. Contact with our Parishioners during this exercise also resulted in several updates of information surrounding emails, phone numbers and home addresses. In some cases Parishioners have asked for some assistance from the Parish Office to change their ongoing contribution method from 'Cash' to "Electronic Funds Transfer". These follow up tasks will be attended to in coming weeks.

The Word

Sunday 12 September 2021: 24th Sunday of Ordinary Time

First Reading

From the prophet Isaiah Is 50:5-9

I gave my body to those who struck me. The Lord has opened my ear. For my part, I made no resistance, neither did I turn away. I offered my back to those who struck me, my cheeks to those who tore at my beard; I did not cover my face against insult and spittle. The Lord comes to my help, so that I am untouched by the insults. So, too, I set my face like flint; I know I shall not be shamed. My vindicator is here at hand. Does anyone start proceedings against me? Then let us go to court together. Who thinks he has a case against me? Let him approach me. The Lord is coming to my help, who dare condemn me? The Word of the Lord.

Responsorial Psalm PS 114:1-6. 8-9. R. v.9 (R.) I will walk in the presence of the Lord, in the land of the living.

- 1. I love the Lord for he has heard the cry of my appeal; for he turned his ear to me in the day when I called him. (R.)
- 2. They surrounded me, the snares of death, with anguish of the tomb; they caught me, sorrow and distress. I called on the Lord's name. O Lord my God, deliver me! (R.)

Second Reading

From the letter of St St James 2:14-18

Faith without good works is dead.

Take the case, my brothers, of someone who has never done a single good act but claims that he has faith. Will that faith save him? If one of the brothers or one of the sisters is in need of clothes and has not enough food to live on, and one of you says to them, 'I wish you well; keep yourself warm and eat plenty,' without giving them these bare necessities of life, then what good is that? Faith is like that: if good works do not go with it, it is quite dead. This is the way to talk to people of that kind: 'You say you have faith and I have good deeds; I will prove to you that I have faith by showing you my good deeds — now you prove to me that you have faith without any good deeds to show.' The Word of the Lord.

Gospel

From the holy Gospel according to Mark Mk 8:27-35

You are the Christ ... the Son of Man was destined to suffer much.

Jesus and his disciples left for the villages round Caesarea Philippi. On the way he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say I am?' And they told him. 'John the Baptist,' they said, 'others Elijah; others again, one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he asked, 'who do you say I am?' Peter spoke up and said to him, 'You are the Christ.' And he gave them strict orders not to tell anyone about him.

And he began to teach them that the Son of Man was destined to suffer grievously, to be rejected by the elders and the chief priests and the scribes, and to be put to death, and after three days to rise again; and he said all this quite openly. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. But, turning and seeing his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said to him, 'Get behind me, Satan! Because the way you think is not God's way but man's.'

He called the people and his disciples to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it.'
