Dear Parishioners,

One of the four candles on an Advent wreath is usually a rose-colour. This is the candle lit today, the Third Sunday of Advent, the Sunday also named Gaudete or 'rejoicing' Sunday, a name taken from the opening word of the Entrance Antiphon for today's Mass.

Before the birth of Christ people often seemed to be at a loss about how to live in harmony with God. While they received the law through Moses as a gift, they soon tragically reduced this life-giving direction to little rules that served to bind rather than free. Those who are captive struggle to sing songs of rejoicing. Such directionless people flock to John of the Christian era, firstly to the people, then tax collectors, then the soldiers. Afterwards John declares before them all that Christ whom they had awaited was immanent and the era they had long awaited had arrived.

The risk we face is to see the arrival of the Messiah only as a historical event. The reality is that Jesus Christ, who overcame death, is present in our world today, and wherever there is love, there is God. There is no greater cause for rejoicing than awareness of this fact.

Uluru Statement From The Heart


The Social Justice Group warmly invites you to a presentation and discussion about the Uluru Statement From The Heart. The presentation will commence after the 10am Mass this weekend (Sunday, 12 December).

What Is The Uluru Statement From The Heart?

The Statement was released in 2017, after the 16 member Referendum Council travelled around the country meeting with over 1,200 people representing approximately 800,000 indigenous people. It calls for a First Nations voice in the Constitution and a process of truth telling and ‘agreement-making’. It is an invitation to all Australians to come together in this process.

Why Is A Discussion Needed?

It is important we are all informed ahead of a proposed referendum. The referendum may occur at any time from the next Federal Election.

From the holy Gospel according to Luke Lk 3:10-18

What, then, must we do?

When all the people asked John, 'What must we do?' he answered, 'If anyone has two tunics he must share with the man who has none, and the one with something to eat must do the same.' There were tax collectors too who came for baptism, and these said to him, 'Master, what must we do?' He said to them, 'Exact no more than your rate.' Some soldiers asked him in their turn, 'What about us? What must we do?' He said to them, 'No intimidation! No extortion! Be content with your pay!' A feeling of expectancy had grown among the people, who were beginning to think that John might be the Christ, so John declared before them all, 'I baptise you with water, but someone is coming, someone who is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to undo the strap of his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fan is in his hand to clear his threshing-floor and to gather the wheat into his barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire that will never go out.' As well as this, there were many other things he said to exhort the people and to announce the Good News to them.
