Sir, give me some of that water. (Gospel)

Dear Parishioners and visitors to the Parish,

St Teresa of Avila was born in Ávila in Spain and entered the Carmelite convent there at the age of 20, not because of any great attraction to the

religious life but because it seemed the most sensible thing to do. At this time Carmelite convents were comfortable places. One was well looked after, had as much contact with the outside world as one wanted, and could keep one's own possessions. With time, and despite ill-health, she made great progress in contemplative prayer and had a number of mystical experiences, which she treated with great suspicion since she felt that she was not nearly holy enough to be accorded them by God.

Teresa's prayer life led her to seek a more perfect life, and in 1562, in the face of much opposition, she founded a convent of Discalced Carmelite nuns in Ávila. "Discalced" ("shoeless") signified their devotion to poverty. The rest of her life is a story of the establishment of more and more Discalced Carmelite convents in the face of intense opposition from the both religious and secular sources but help came from the highest authority at the same time. Thus in 1566 the General of the Carmelite Order approved Teresa's original foundation and permitted her to make new ones. In 1575 the chapter of the Order decided to dissolve them all, and for the next five years every effort was made to destroy Teresa's reforms both the nuns and the friars. John of the Cross was imprisoned and cruelly treated but during that time he wrote the Spiritual Canticle which was not only great poetry but was of real encounter with the living God. It is a Christian classic and so has perennial value.

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At length, in 1580, and with the support of King Philip II, the Discalced Carmelites were made independent and St Teresa was able to found more new convents. She died, worn out by her efforts, on 15 October 1582.

St Teresa is an outstanding example of how the contemplative life can well up and overflow into action. In addition to all this, she wrote much on the subject of contemplative prayer and her writings are still standard works today. She was declared a Doctor of the Church by Pope Paul VI in 1970.

A favourite story about St Teresa illustrates the intimate relationship that the saints have with God. When she was on one of her innumerable journeys across Spain, her horse threw her as she was crossing a river. Soaked to the skin she looked up to heaven and said, "If this is how you treat your friends, no wonder you have so few of them!" There is being real with God in our prayer but also a touch of humour .

History of

Corpus Christi Parish

The formal beginnings of the Catholic Parish of St Ives were marked by the building of the first Corpus Christi Church (now the Hall) in 1953, with the foundation stone being laid on October 18th. The area was then part of the Pymble Parish and served by Priests from there. In those early years the parishioners were

predominantly orchardists and market gardeners.


From as early as 1937 the Passionist College, where young men studied before joining the Passionist Community of Priests, had been a significant presence in the area.

In 1954 the Brigidine Sisters came to St Ives and began both their College and Corpus Christi School, which initially occupied the new church building during week days.

St Ives was established as a separate Parish by Cardinal Gilroy in 1958 when he appointed Fr Peter Sheil as first Parish Priest.

This year marks the 70th anniversary of our parish hall, which was our original Church at St Ives.


22 OCTOBER 2023

Social Justice Corner

Pope Francis has asked Catholics to pray the Rosary as the world looks on in horror at the violence in Israel. He has called on Catholics to pray through the intercession of Mary "for the gift of peace for the many countries of the world marked by war and conflict".

Fr Gabriel Romanelli, who serves as pastor of the Holy Family Parish in Gaza, the only Catholic Church in Gaza, reported this week, "As much as we suspected that something was going to happen, more by way of experience I never imagined something like this..... In the parish, we have taken in more than 80 Christians, and other Muslim neighbours of our school have requested accommodation. There are hundreds of dead and thousands of injured among the population".

Recalling a saying of Pope Pius XII, which St John Paul II also repeated, Fr Romanelli has requested prayers because *"nothing is lost with peace, everything can be lost with war."*

Following the meeting Father Roger will be speaking to us about his recent Marian Pilgrimage and his attendance at World Youth Day in Lisbon.




Pray and Play is for babies, toddlers, and primary school children together with their families.

The Word Sunday 15 October 2023, 28th Sunday in Ordinary Time—St Teresa of Avila

First Reading

A reading from the book of Wisdom 7:7-14 *I entreated, and the spirit of Wisdom came to me.* I prayed, and understand was given me; I entreated, and the spirit of Wisdom came to me. I esteemed her more than sceptres and thrones; compared with her, I held riches as nothing. I reckoned no priceless stone to be her peer, for compared with her, all gold is a pinch of sand, and beside her silver ranks as mud.

I loved her more than health or beauty, preferred her to the light, since her radiance never sleeps. In her company all good things came to me, at her hands riches not to be numbered. All these I delighted in, since Wisdom brings them, but as yet I did not know she was their mother. What I learned without self-interest, I pass on without reserve; I do not intend to hide her riches.

For she is an inexhaustible treasure to men, and those who acquire it win God's friendship, commended as they are to him by the benefits of her teaching.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 83:2-3, 4-5, 11, 12-13 (R.) My heart sings with joy to the living God.

- 1. How lovely is your dwelling place, Lord, God of hosts. My soul is longing and yearning, is yearning for the courts of the Lord. *(R.)*

Second Reading

From the letter of St Paul the Romans 8:14-17, 26-27

The Spirit himself expresses our plea.

Everyone moved by the Spirit is a son of God. The spirit you received is not the spirit of slaves bringing fear into your lives again; it is the spirit of sons, and it makes us cry out, 'Abba, Father!' The Spirit himself and our spirit bear united witness that we are children of God. And if we are children we are heirs as well: heirs of God and coheirs with Christ, sharing his sufferings so as to share his glory.

The Spirit too comes to help us in our weakness. For when we cannot choose words in order to pray properly, the Spirit himself expresses our plea in a way that could never be put into words, and God who knows everything in our hearts knows perfectly well what he means, and that the pleas of the saints expressed by the Spirit are according to the mind of God. Gospel

From the holy Gospel according to John Jn 4:5-15a

Sir, give me some of that water.

Jesus came to the Samaritan town Sychar, near the land that Jacob gave his son Joseph. Jacob's well is there and Jesus, tired by the journey, sat straight down by the well. It was about the sixth hour. When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, 'Give me a drink.' His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, 'What? You are a Jew and you ask me, a Samaritan, for a drink?' Jews in fact, do not associate with Samaritans. Jesus replied:

'If you only knew what God is offering and who it is that is saying to you: Give me a drink,

you would have been the one to ask,

and he would have given you living water.'

'You have no bucket sir,' she answered 'and the well is deep: how could you get this living water? Are you a greater man than our father Jacob who gave us this well and drank from it himself with his sons and his cattle?' Jesus replied:

'Whoever drinks this water will get thirsty again; but anyone who drinks the water that I shall give will never be thirsty again: the water that I shall give will turn into a spring inside him, welling up to eternal life.'

'Sir,' said the woman, 'give me some of that water.' The Gospel of the Lord.
