It was not you who chose me, but I who chose you and appointed you to go and bear fruit that will remain. (Gospel)

Dear Parishioners,

John 15:1-16: 3 is located at the heart of John's account of Jesus' final night with his disciples (John 13-17). Today's Gospel, taken from

the opening verses of this central passage, uses the model of a vine and its branches to instruct the disciples on the need to maintain union with Jesus. The word that best expresses what Jesus is teaching in these verses is 'remain'. Some translations of the Greek original use the expression 'abide'. The expression appears six times in this Gospel. The relationship between the believer and Jesus should be one of deep intimacy where the life of the believer, described as a branch, draws from the richness of Jesus who identifies himself as the vine.

Jesus tells of two possibilities. Those who remain in Jesus bear fruit, receive all the blessings that they request, and are truly disciples of Jesus. Those who do not remain and fail to bear fruit will be removed from their source, and thus die. Jesus warns: 'Cut off from me you can do nothing'. The opposite is also true: by remaining in Jesus, the disciple can do everything. The theme of 'remaining' does not end as Jesus concludes his references to the vine and the branches. As we will see next Thursday and next Sunday, remaining in Jesus leads to dwelling in his love, but it also generates hatred.

First Reading

From the Acts of the Apostles Acts 9:26-31

He explained how the Lord appeared to Saul

and spoke to him on his journey. When Saul got to Jerusalem he tried to join the disciples, but they were all afraid of him: they could not believe he was really a disciple. Barnabas, however, took charge of him, introduced him to the apostles, and explained how the Lord had appeared to Saul and spoken to him on his journey, and how he had preached boldly at Damascus in the name of Jesus. Saul now started to go round with them in Jerusalem, preaching fearlessly in the name of the Lord. But after he had spoken to the Hellenists, and argued with them, they became determined to kill him. When the brothers knew, they took him to Caesarea, and sent him off from there to Tarsus.

The churches throughout Judaea, Galilee and Samaria were now left in peace, building themselves up, living in the fear of the Lord, and filled with the consolation of the Holy Spirit The Word of the Lord.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 21:26-28. 30-32. R. v.26

(*R*.) I will praise you, Lord, in the assembly of your people.

- 1. My vows I will pay before those who fear him. The poor shall eat and shall have their fill. They shall praise the Lord, those who seek him. May their hearts live for ever and ever! (*R*.)
- 2. All the earth shall remember and return to the Lord, all families of the nations worship before him. They shall worship him, all the mighty of the earth; before him shall bow all who go down to the dust. *(R.)*
- 3. And my soul shall live for him, my children serve him. They shall tell of the Lord to generations yet to come, declare his faithfulness to peoples yet unborn: 'These things the Lord has done.' (*R*.)

Second Reading

From the first letter of St John 1 Jn 3:18-24

His commandments are these: that we believe and that we love one another.

My children, our love is not to be just words or mere talk, but something real and active; only by this can we be certain that we are the children of the truth and be able to quieten our conscience in his presence, whatever accusations it may raise against us, because God is greater than our conscience and he knows everything. My dear people, if we cannot be condemned by our own conscience, we need not be afraid in God's presence, and whatever we ask him, we shall receive, because we keep his commandments and live the kind of life that he wants.

His commandments are these: that we believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and that we love one another as he told us to. Whoever keeps his commandments lives in God and God lives in him. We know that he lives in us by the Spirit that he has given us.

Alleluia, alleluia! Live in me and let me live in you, says the Lord; my branches bear much fruit. Alleluia!

Gospel

From the holy Gospel according to John Jn 15:1-8

All who live in me, and I in them, bear much fruit. Jesus said to his disciples: 'I am the true vine, and my Father is the vinedresser. Every branch in me that bears no fruit he cuts away, and every branch that does bear fruit he prunes to make it bear even more. You are pruned already, by means of the word that I have spoken to you. Make your home in me, as I make mine in you. As a branch cannot bear fruit all by itself, but must remain part of the vine, neither can you unless you remain in me. I am the vine. you are the branches. Whoever remains in me, with me in him, bears fruit in plenty; for cut off from me you can do nothing. Anyone who does not remain in me is like a branch that has been thrown away - he withers: these branches are collected and thrown on the fire, and they are burnt. If you remain in me and my words remain in you, you may ask what you will and you shall get it. It is to the glory of my Father that you should bear much fruit. and then you will be my disciples.' The Gospel of the Lord.
