

Dear parishioners and visitors to the Parish,

'You cannot be the slave both of God and money.' To be a slave is to be owned by somebody or something.

As Christians we are owned by God in as much as we are made in God's image and at baptism we are claimed for Christ in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. To be owned by God is to be secure in our deepest identity. But we only need look around us to see that we live in a world where many are a slave not to God, but to money - that is, rather than earn money as a means of paying for things they need, they are owned by money or the pursuit of it. This kind of disordered attachment can have serious consequences for our lives. It might mean we never see our spouse or children because of the long hours spent at the office. It might mean we start to look for morally or legally dubious shortcuts for making money and getting rich quick. When we live with God as our first priority, our life is ordered rightly and everything else flows in right order. We are not saying that money in itself is an evil—what is important is that we do not want to cling to it. If there is a

conflict between money and God, we want to choose God.

### **Social Justice Gathering**

The 2025–2026 Australian Catholic Bishops Conference Social Justice Statement, *Signs of Hope on the Edge*, calls us to see, listen to, and walk alongside those on the margins. We are challenged to move beyond charity into action, recognising every person's name, dignity, and story, building relationships rooted in solidarity and turning reflection into response.

On Saturday, 27th September, you are invited to join a discussion and reflection on the statement organised by the Justice and Peace Office. The event will include:

- experience of homelessness and experiences of poor mental health.
- Scenario-based activities inspired by the Statement's reflection questions which will invite participants into real-life situations and explore real-life solutions.
- Table talks to unpack the Bishops' call for encounter, identify gaps in current responses, and co-create solutions.
- Action mapping to guide parishes, schools, and communities in committing to tangible local advocacy and outcomes.
- Take away resources that prompt discussion, education, and guidance to move beyond the day.

### **Urgent Appeal – Support for the Matheson Family**



### The Word

### Sunday 21st of September 2025: 25th Sunday in Ordinary Time

#### Collect

O God, who founded all the commands of your sacred Law upon love of you and of our neighbour, grant that, by keeping your precepts, we may merit to attain eternal life.

Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.

### First Reading

From the book of the prophet Amos Am 8:4-7 The Lord God spoke against those who buy the poor for money.

Listen to this, you who trample on the needy and try to suppress the poor people of the country, you who say, 'When will New Moon be over so that we can sell our corn, and sabbath, so that we can market our wheat?

Then by lowering the bushel, raising the shekel, by swindling and tampering with the scales, we can buy up the poor for money, and the needy for a pair of sandals, and get a price even for the sweepings of the wheat.' The Lord swears it by the pride of Jacob.

### **Responsorial Psalm**

Ps 112:1-2. 4-8. R. cf. vv.1,7 (R.) Praise the Lord who lifts up the poor.

- 1. Praise, O servants of the Lord, praise the name of the Lord! May the name of the Lord be blessed both now and for evermore! (R.)
- 2. High above all nations is the Lord, above the heavens his glory. Who is like the Lord, our God, who has risen on high to his throne yet stoops from the heights to look down, to look down upon heaven and earth? (R.)

#### Second Reading

From the letter of St Paul to Timothy 1 Tim 2:1-8 Let prayers be offered to God for everyone; he wants all people to be saved.

My advice is that, first of all, there should be prayers offered for everyone – petitions, intercessions and thanksgiving – and especially for kings and others in authority, so that we may be able to live religious and reverent lives in peace and quiet. To do this is right, and will please God our saviour: he wants everyone to be saved and reach full knowledge of the truth. For there is only one God, and there is only one

mediator between God and mankind, himself a man, Christ Jesus, who sacrificed himself as a ransom for them all. He is the evidence of this, sent at the appointed time, and I have been named a herald and apostle of it and – I am telling the truth and no lie – a teacher of the faith and the truth to the pagans. In every place, then, I want the men to lift their hands up reverently in prayer, with no anger or argument. The Word of the Lord.

### **Gospel Acclamation**

Alleluia, alleluia! Jesus Christ was rich but he became poor, to make you rich out of his poverty. Alleluia!

#### Gospel

From the holy Gospel according to Luke Lk 16:1-13 You cannot be slaves both of God and of money. Jesus said to his disciples: 'There was a rich man and he had a steward who was denounced to him for being wasteful with his property. He called for the man and said, "What is this I hear about you? Draw me up an account of your stewardship because you are not to be my steward any longer." Then the steward said to himself, "Now that my master is taking the stewardship from me, what am I to do? Dig? I am not strong enough. Go begging? I should be too ashamed. Ah, I know what I will do to make sure that when I am dismissed from office there will be some to welcome me into their homes." 'Then he called his master's debtors one by one. To

the first he said, "How much do you owe my master?" "One hundred measures of oil," was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond; sit down straight away and write fifty." To another he said, "And you, sir, how much do you owe?" "One hundred measures of wheat," was the reply. The steward said, "Here, take your bond and write eighty."

'The master praised the dishonest steward for his astuteness. For the children of this world are more astute in dealing with their own kind than are the children of light.

'And so I tell you this: use money, tainted as it is, to win you friends, and thus make sure that when it fails you, they will welcome you into the tents of eternity. The man who can be trusted in little things can be trusted in great; the man who is dishonest in little things will be dishonest in great. If then you cannot be trusted with money, that tainted thing, who will trust you with genuine riches? And if you cannot be trusted with what is not yours, who will give you what is your very own?

'No servant can be the slave of two masters: he will either hate the first and love the second, or treat the first with respect and the second with scorn. You cannot be the slave both of God and of money.' The Gospel of the Lord.
