Dear Parishioners

The Gospel reading for this Sunday contains the great commandment Jesus gave us to love God and to love one another as ourselves. The verse that ‘you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul and with all your mind’ can be broken down into its three elements: heart, soul and mind.

- 1) Loving God with our heart requires a deep commitment to give yourself daily to God, accepting that all things flow from God and return to God.
- 2) Loving God with your soul allows you to reflect and contemplate God and to pray constantly and with sincerity and gratitude.
- 3) Lastly, loving God with your mind compels you to give both your head and your heart to God. Our mind is often caught up in logical and rational thought and can easily embrace the ‘prove it to me’ mentality.

However, loving God with one’s mind requires a deep humility to accept that God exceeds our understanding and is beyond the depth of the human intellect. How do you love God each day— with heart, soul and mind?

NOVEMBER IS A SPECIAL MONTH WHEN WE REMEMBER OUR DEPARTED LOVED ONES

St Irenaeus said only what is experienced by Jesus is redeemed. Jesus experienced human death and hence his saving action on the cross reaches even to the dead. In fact, when he died his body remained in the tomb but his soul descended into the realm of the dead. That is where Adam, Eve, the patriarchs like Abraham, the prophets like Isaiah and many other good but not perfect people were. No one could enter heaven until Jesus first entered there. When Jesus met those in the underworld, he said to them: "Now your salvation is at hand." He then took them to where his body was and said: "See the wounds on my back, the holes where the nails entered my feet, and hands, the piercing of my heart where my last drop of blood and water was shed for you. That is how much I love you." Then his soul entered his body and he rose gloriously. They knew that what happened to Jesus would happen to them. We know by faith that the same is true for us. We do have a glorious future.

Because of Jesus Christ forgiveness and love cross the grave. We may pray effectively for our departed loved ones but they cannot pray for themselves. However, they can and will pray for us especially expressing their gratitude as we pray for them. The Eucharist is one of the most powerful ways of so acting because sacramentally we have present the saving event of the cross.

Hence I encourage you to pray for your departed beloved ones by making a small donation and putting it in an envelope found in the foyer. I will probably do both for my father and mother and my two brothers who have gone before me.

2020 has certainly been an unusual and eventful year, but despite the challenges, our Parish has made much progress with pastoral and formation initiatives. We also now have a Parish Vision Statement that will be able to guide us into the years ahead.

Who Is Corpus Christi?

Corpus Christi is a welcoming caring, joyful, faith community with Jesus as the heart of the parish and Mary as our spiritual mother, inspired by our Carmelite Spirituality.

Vision

To be an invitational parish that leads people to experience and respond to God's love, continually growing in relationship with Jesus as missionary disciples who connect and serve, pray and worship, give and actively share our gifts in the power of the Holy Spirit.

Our Purpose

We grow in friendship as disciples of Jesus and bear witness to the experience as we take the message of the Gospel to others.

The role of the PPC is to foster the pastoral life of the Parish. In other words, we look forward to how best to achieve this future goal, in a strategic manner and carry out its mission. A key task of the PPC in coming months will be to prepare a 3-year Parish Pastoral Plan so that the Parish can move more intentionally towards making our vision a reality.

We are now undergoing a process to appoint 4 new members to the PPC, and **invite all parishioners to recommend other parishioners (or themselves)** who they feel have the right skills and gifts for this role at this particular time in the life of the Parish. In terms of our vision the skills and gifts we are looking for, are:

- An excitement about the vision
- Be willing to discern God's plan for Corpus Christi
- Be able to compliment each other's gifts in a team environment

THE PARISH PASTORAL COUNCIL

The purpose of our Parish Pastoral Council (PPC) is to promote and support the evangelising mission of the Parish, working in collaboration with the Parish Priest to foster the spiritual and pastoral life of all the Christian faithful. The PPC enables the members of the Parish community to fulfil their baptismal calling to share in Christ's mission and to connect their needs and their strengths with the Parish's plans for the future.

THE PPC:

- Meets regularly with Fr Greg, usually on a monthly basis
- Reflects on the life of the parish community
- Acts as the body in the Parish from which Fr. Greg seeks advice about the pastoral life and strategic direction of the Parish community
- Discerns key pastoral priorities and initiatives as part of parish pastoral planning
- Reflects on the 'signs of the times' and the context of the Parish, and considers how the Parish can best carry out its mission, as in our vision and purpose statements.
- Brings forth issues and considerations from the members of the Parish community which might shape the life and future of the Parish community

THE PARISH COUNCIL IS COMPRISED OF 11 PERSONS

- 8 members are appointed to the Council, by recommendation or by direct appointment
- The Principal of Corpus Christi Primary School, the Religious Education Coordinator of Corpus Christi Primary School, and a member of the Finance Committee are *ex officio* members of the Parish Pastoral Council

The 4 members of the current Parish Pastoral Council who continue in their 4-year term until the end of 2022 are:

- Sherwell Fernando
- Andrena Brewer
- Jennifer Perrott

Recommendations for 4 new members are now invited from the community

The terms of membership of each of the new members will be a maximum of 4 years (membership is normally 2 years with a further 2 year option). This means, therefore, that the membership of our Parish Pastoral Council rotates with new members every 2 years.

THE PROCESS

From the weekend of 17/18 October 2020 through to 1 November 2020, recommendations for positions on the Parish Pastoral Council are called. Recommendations need to be of those who show:

- A commitment to the practice of the faith, to the parish community, and to the purpose and vision of Corpus Christi Parish;
- An ability to collaborate, consult and discern with others for the mission of the Church;
- Good communication and interpersonal skills;
- A capacity to think strategically toward the development of Parish Pastoral Plans.

All parishioners recommended will be invited to an Information Evening to better understand the role of a PPC Councillor, and to accept nomination. Those nominated will be invited to a Discernment Evening to determine the members of the Council.

Thank you for your consideration and participation. Please pray that the Holy Spirit will guide us all during this process of discernment.

First Reading

A reading from the book of Exodus Ex 22:20-26

If you are harsh with the widow or the orphan, my anger will rage against you.

The Lord said to Moses, 'Tell the sons of Israel this, "You must not molest the stranger or oppress him, for you lived as strangers in the land of Egypt. You must not be harsh with the widow, or with the orphan; if you are harsh with them, they will surely cry out to me, and be sure I shall hear their cry; my anger will flare and I shall kill you with the sword, your own wives will be widows, your own children orphans.

"If you lend money to any of my people, to any poor man among you, you must not play the usurer with him: you must not demand interest from him.

"If you take another's cloak as a pledge, you must give it back to him before sunset. It is all the covering he has; it is the cloak he wraps his body in; what else would he sleep in? If he cries to me, I will listen, for I am full of pity."

Second Reading

From the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians 1:5-10

You turned away from idols to serve God and await his Son.

You observed the sort of life we lived when we were with you, which was for your instruction, and you were led to become imitators of us, and of the Lord; and it was with the joy of the Holy Spirit that you took to the gospel, in spite of the great opposition all round you. This has made you the great example to all believers in Macedonia and Achaia since it was from you that the word of the Lord started to spread – and not only throughout Macedonia and Achaia, for the news of your faith in God has spread everywhere. We do not need to tell other people about it: other people tell us how we started the work among you, how you broke with idolatry when you were converted to God and became servants of the real, living God; and how you are now waiting for Jesus, his Son, whom he raised from the dead, to come from heaven to save us from the retribution which is coming.

Jesus said, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second resembles it: you must love your neighbour as yourself. On these two commandments hang the whole Law, and the Prophets also.'
