Dear Parishioners,

Scripture scholars (perhaps with John 6:60 in mind)

sometimes refer to the 'hard sayings' of Jesus—aspects of his teaching which may, at first glance, seem unduly demanding, even unreasonable, to his would-be disciples. In interpreting these 'hard sayings', we must make allowance for the fact that Jesus is sometimes speaking metaphorically and using Semitic hyperbole. If we take literally (as doubtless some people have done) Jesus' words, 'If your eye should cause you to sin, tear it out', we may find ourselves like Dickens's irascible schoolmaster, Wackford Squeers, who 'had but one eye, and the popular prejudice runs in favour of two'. As we reflect on Jesus' 'hard sayings' in today's Gospel reading, we may feel rather discouraged. Even despite our best efforts, our life of faith falls far short of the ideal that he proposes. At such times we need to turn to God who is rich in mercy and pray like the father of the boy from whom Jesus expelled an unclean spirit—'I do have faith. Help the little faith I have!' (Mark 9:24). Take heart and say with Paul: 'There is nothing I cannot master with the help of the One who gives me strength.' (Philippians 4:13).






SOCIAL JUSTICE CORNER:

Migrant and Refugee Sunday:

'Towards an Ever Wider We.'

The recent unrest in Afghanistan has brought the issue of welcoming those in need to the forefront of many people's minds. This weekend, Catholics around the world are celebrating Migrant and Refugee Sunday. It is an opportunity to consider how we can pray for and offer practical support to our neighbours around the world.



The 2021 theme for Migrant and Refugee Sunday is 'Towards an Ever Wider We.' Pope Francis has released a message for Migrant and Refugee Sunday with an emphasis on creating a diverse and beautiful world which celebrates our differences while remaining as one. As Pope Francis reminds us:

"... we are all in the same boat and called to work together, so that there will be no more walls that separate us, no longer others, but only a single 'we', encompassing all of humanity."

The Corpus Christi Social Justice Group continues to provide practical support to the Tibetan refugee community living on the Northern Beaches. The annual blanket appeal and raffle to raise funds to support the community with prescription medication and emergency assistance has been postponed until the end of this year due to the current stay-at-home orders.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2021

Dear Parishioners

This last year to June 2021 has been another challenging one for our priests, our parish and our parishioners. We are grateful for the wonderful support of our parishioners, many of whom work behind the scenes to assist with the day to day running of the parish. We are also grateful to our office staff who work hard to provide the support services needed to keep the parish going.

In October last year the parish was advised that the diocese intended selling Murphy house, which is the priory occupied by our parish priests. Fr Greg advised all parishioners of this via a letter in the parish bulletin. Subsequently the diocese has advised that Murphy house will be put up for sale in October this year with a sale and leaseback arrangement. The leaseback arrangement will be for two years to allow the parish time to build a new presbytery. The diocese will fund the lease for the two years so there will not be a cost to the parish over that period. As a result, your finance committee together with the help of suitably qualified parishioners have been working on a plan to rehouse our parish priests in a suitable presbytery. We are currently investigating the most appropriate options for a new presbytery to be constructed next to or adjoining the parish office. As soon as we have some definite options and some idea of what the costs may be we will advise all parishioners. In the meantime we would welcome any assistance from parishioners who are or have contacts in the building and construction industry.

On the finance side we managed to achieve an operating surplus for the year thanks to the generosity of our parishioners. The installation of the tap & go machines has been successful in improving the amount we received from the "loose" second collection. Unfortunately, we had an overall deficit after some non-recurring expenses and the roof loan repayments. The non-recurring expenses included new carpets for the parish office and a shortfall in superannuation payments from previous years. The roof loan will be fully paid off by the end of November this year.

As with last year we applied for and received the Jobkeeper allowance. This has helped us maintain our staff levels and has also meant that we did not have to reduce our staff numbers or the hours that they worked. We also applied for and received the cash flow boost.

During the year we replaced all the heavy tables in the hall with new, easy to carry, tables. This will make it a lot easier for parishioners to set up and take down the tables for functions in the hall. We express our sincere gratitude to the parishioner who donated the funds for the purchase of the new tables. We are also grateful to the parishioner who managed to sell or give away all the old tables, saving us the job of having to take them away.

Our parish continues to follow its mission of seeking to "Evangelise, celebrate our faith, foster community and serve God and each other." Our goal is Missionary Discipleship. We are moving from a maintenance church to a missionary one in keeping with Jesus' great commission: "Go make disciples of all nations, baptise them in the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit and teach them to obey all I have commanded you" (Mt 28).

The parish pastoral council has been engrossed with developing strategies and plans for the achievement of the parish vision. Initial consultative discussions were held with the parishioners and further interactions will commence once COVID restrictions are lifted.

Over the year, with the able assistance of Jen Perrott, we ran two Alpha programmes, the Big Picture programme as well as commenced the Wild Goose Holy Spirit series. The two Alpha programmes had a total of 29 guests and 17 team members, Big Picture had 6 guests and the Wild Goose Holy Spirit Series has 52 participants. Due to COVID all these programmes were run online. This has resulted in parishioners getting to know each other better and a significant number have been touched by the Spirit in relation to their faith.

Our mission depends on our parishioners' support, and we thank you for your contributions over the last twelve months.

Sacramental programme

The Children's Sacramental Programme is a three-stage process that is delivered over a twelve month period. The first sacrament in this programme is Confirmation, followed by Reconciliation and is completed with First Holy Communion, when the children become fully initiated into the Church.

Our thanks go to Gerri Hadwen, our Sacramental Co-Ordinator, for the wonderful work she has done in working with the families to prepare the children for the sacraments.

Over the year we had 74 children through the programme, 46 for confirmation and 28 for first Eucharist. The children came from both our local Corpus Christi Parish School and the state schools in our area.

Catechists

Our catechists, led by Jennifer Perrot, put a lot of work into preparing lessons, activities of significance and attending professional development opportunities. Our catechists bring the Word of God to children in state schools in our area and assist in preparing those children to receive the Sacraments. Due to COVID we are struggling to get catechists and would welcome further volunteers for this very important ministry.

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The Word

Sunday 26 September 2021: 26th Sunday of Ordinary Time

First Reading

From the book of Numbers Nm 11:25-29

Are you jealous on my account? Who decrees that all people may prophesy?

The Lord came down in the Cloud. He spoke with Moses, but took some of the spirit that was on him and put it on the seventy elders. When the spirit came on them they prophesied, but not again. Two men had stayed back in the camp; one was called Eldad and the other Medad. The spirit came down on them; though they had not gone to the Tent, their names were enrolled among the rest. These began to prophesy in the camp. The young man ran to tell this to Moses, 'Look', he said, 'Eldad and Medad are prophesying in the camp.' Then said Joshua the son of Nun, who had served Moses from his youth, 'My Lord Moses, stop them!' Moses answered him, 'Are you jealous on my account? If only the whole people of the Lord were prophets, and the Lord gave his Spirit to them all! The Word of the Lord.

All your gold and your silver are corroding away, and the same corrosion will be your own sentence, and eat into your body. It was a burning fire that you stored up as your treasure for the last days. Labourers mowed your fields, and you cheated them listen to the wages that you kept back, calling out; realise that the cries of the reapers have reached the ears of the Lord of hosts. On earth you have had a life of comfort and luxury; in the time of slaughter you went on eating to your heart's content. It was you who condemned the innocent and killed them; they offered you no resistance. The Word of the Lord.

Gospel

From the holy Gospel according to Mark Mk 9:38-43. 45. 47-48

Anyone who is not against us is for us. If your hand should cause you to sin, cut it off.

John said to Jesus, 'Master, we saw a man who is not one of us casting out devils in your name; and because he was not one of us we tried to stop him.' But Jesus said, 'You must not stop him: no one who works a miracle in my name is likely to speak evil of me. Anyone who is not against us is for us.

'If anyone gives you a cup of water to drink just because you belong to Christ, then I tell you solemnly, he will most certainly not lose his reward.

'But anyone who is an obstacle to bring down one of these little ones who have faith, would be better thrown into the sea with a great millstone round his neck. And if your hand should cause you to sin, cut it off; it is better for you to enter into life crippled, than to have two hands and go to hell, into the fire that cannot be put out. And if your foot should cause you to sin, cut it off; it is better for you to enter into life lame, than to have two feet and be thrown into hell. And if your eye should cause you to sin, tear it out; it is better for you to enter into the kingdom of God with one eye, than to have two eyes and be thrown into hell where their worm does not die nor their fire go out.'
