Dear Parishioners,

Jesus rarely seems to get on well with the religious elite of his time. Y et here we have

Jairus, a prominent member of the synagogue, desperate for help and ready for faith. Jesus leads many supplicants on a faith journey, step by step, until they accept his gift. Jairus' healed daughter is unnamed, without a speaking part, yet is a favourite biblical character for many young girls. We can only imagine what life was like for them after Jesus' visit. The girl was obviously well-loved, but did her thoughts and actions change after the experience? Was she treated any differently? How did Jairus and is wife explain the story to the family and other Jewish leaders? Or did they keep quiet as Jesus advised and ponder the experience in their hearts?

Take some time to read through the story again and put yourself in the scene. Which character would you be? How would you react to Jesus? The first reading reminds us that our God is a God of life and goodness, and we are made in God's image. So you might end with a prayer of thanks for the healing, and for all the good, in your own life.

SOCIAL JUSTICE CORNER:

150 Days of Action For Refugees and Asylum Seekers

The Holy Father, Pope Francis, has declared 2021 to be the year of St. Joseph, who was himself a refugee. In his apostolic letter which instituted the year, *Patris corde* ("With a Father's Heart"), Pope Francis names St. Joseph as "the special patron of all those forced to leave their native lands because of war, hatred, persecution and poverty." Since then, Pope Francis has also added to St. Joseph's titles that of "Patron of Refugees". Refugee Week, which has been celebrated in Australia in the past week, provides us with an excellent opportunity to reflect on the role of St. Joseph in the Catholic Church.

A coalition, led by the Sisters of St. Joseph and the Justice and Peace Office of the Catholic Archdiocese of Sydney, has come together to initiate 150 days of action across Australia, to engage with people of good will, and advocate to change our country's attitude and policies towards those seeking protection in Australia. The campaign began on 1 May 2021, the Feast of St. Joseph the Worker and will conclude with a Day of Lamentation and Call on Sunday 26th September 2021, the World Day of Migrants and Refugees.



FINANCE UPDATE – NINE MONTHS TO 31 MARCH 2021



THANK YOU FOR YOUR GENEROSITY IN TIME, TALENT AND TREASURE Dear Parishioners

For the nine months to 31 March 2021 our total income was \$243,645, which, at face value, is higher than the same period in the prior year.

However, our income was boosted by the job keeper subsidy and cash boost stimulus from the ATO by \$64,000. If this subsidy is deducted from our income the picture is not quite as rosy as our income before the subsidy was \$179,645, a decrease of around 4% from the prior year. This may be as a result of our planned giving receipts being lower than for the same period last year. It is pleasing to see that our loose collection (including tap and go) was virtually in line with the prior year. To assist us in budgeting we do encourage those parishioners who have not yet committed to our planned giving to please do so by way of a direct debit or credit card. If you would like to know how to contribute by direct debit or credit card the Parish Office would be glad to assist. We are doing our best to control our expenses and this is reflected in the decrease in expenses compared to the same period last year.

The amount owing on the roof loan at 31 March 2021 was \$21,664 and we continue to make our normal monthly repayments.

As mentioned in the last finance update the Diocese will be selling Murphy House, currently used by our Carmelite priests as their priory. We are currently working on a plan to house our Parish priests in a presbytery to be built on the land adjacent to the Parish office. This plan is still in its early stages and is being managed by two of our parishioners who are experienced in the building and construction industry. We will certainly update parishioners as soon as we have more detail on the plan for the presbytery so that parishioners can provide their input.

We thank you for your generosity in the past and at present. Considering a bequest is one way of helping future generations continue to have the same spiritual and nurturing experience that we have had. For information on how to go about this, please contact the Parish Office.

We thank all parishioners for their continued support as we all work together during these difficult times to enhance our Parish.

Gospel

From the holy Gospel according to Mark Mk 5:21-43

Young girl, I say to you, arise.

When Jesus had crossed in the boat to the other side, a large crowd gathered round him and he stayed by the lakeside. Then one of the synagogue officials came up, Jairus by name, and seeing him, fell at his feet and pleaded with him earnestly, saying, 'My little daughter is desperately sick. Do come and lay your hands on her to make her better and save her life.' Jesus went with him and a large crowd followed him; they were pressing all round him.

Now there was a woman who had suffered from a haemorrhage for twelve years; after long and painful treatment under various doctors, she had spent all she had without being any the better for it, in fact, she was getting worse. She had heard about Jesus, and she came up behind him through the crowd and touched his cloak. 'If I can touch even his clothes,' she had told herself 'I will be well again.' And the source of the bleeding dried up instantly, and she felt in herself that she was cured of her complaint. Immediately aware that power had gone out from him, Jesus turned round in the crowd and said, 'Who touched my clothes?' His disciples said to him, 'You see how the crowd is pressing round you and yet you say, "Who touched me?" But he continued to look all round to see who had done it. Then the woman came forward, frightened and trembling because she knew what had happened to her, and she fell at his feet and told him the whole truth. 'My daughter,' he said 'your faith has restored you to health; go in peace and be free from your complaint.'

While he was still speaking some people arrived from the house of the synagogue official to say, 'Your daughter is dead: why put the Master to any further trouble?' But Jesus had overheard this remark of theirs and he said to the official, 'Do not be afraid; only have faith.' And he allowed no one to go with him except Peter and James and John the brother of James. So they came to the official's house and Jesus noticed all the commotion, with people weeping and wailing unrestrainedly. He went in and said to them, 'Why all this commotion and crying? The child is not dead, but asleep.' But they laughed at him. So he turned them all out and, taking with him the child's father and mother and his own companions, he went into the place where the child lay. And taking the child by the hand he said to her, 'Talitha, kum!' which means, 'little girl, I tell you to get up.' The little girl got up at once and began to walk about, for she was twelve years old. At this they were overcome with astonishment, and he ordered them strictly not to let anyone know about it, and told them to give her something to eat. The Gospel of the Lord
