When vintage time drew near, he sent his servants to the tenants to obtain his produce.
(Gospel)

Dear Parishioners and visitors to the Parish,

The People of God are portrayed as a vineyard in both the Old and New Testaments. In every case, God is the one who plants the vineyard, after choosing the best and most fertile land and preparing it carefully. Go then looks for a good harvest, only to be disappointed time and again.

In the first reading, God is disappointed because the vineyard produces sour grapes (some translations say 'rotten'). There is nothing to do but tear the vineyard down. Isaiah is warning the people that God plans to do the same with Israel. God look for justice from Israel, and instead it produced a harvest of bloodshed.

The gospel parable tells the history of Israel as God's vineyard. The owner of the vineyard leased it out to tenants. Later, the owner sent servants to collect the portion of the harvest that was due to him. The servants represent the prophets whom God regularly sent to Israel, only to see them rejected, abused and sometimes killed. Finally, the owner sends his son to them but he, too, is killed. (Jesus' opponents know that he is referring to himself.) The owner is left with no alternative but to lease the vineyard to other tenants who will deliver the share of the produce to him when harvest time comes.

What is that good fruit that Jesus wants from his vineyard? St Paul tells us: 'everything that is true, everything that is noble, everything that is good and pure, everything that we love and honour, everything that can be thought virtuous and worthy of praise'. Keep doing these things that you 'have heard or seen that I do. Then the God of peace will be with you.'

History of Corpus Christi Parish

The formal beginnings of the Catholic Parish of St Ives were marked by the building of the first Corpus Christi Church (now the Hall) in 1953, with the foundation stone being laid on October 18th. The area was then part of the Pymble Parish and served by Priests from there. In those early years the parishioners were predominantly orchardists and market gardeners.


From as early as 1937 the Passionist College, where young men studied before joining the Passionist Community of Priests, had been a significant presence in the area.

In 1954 the Brigidine Sisters came to St Ives and began both their College and Corpus Christi School, which initially occupied the new church building during week days.

St Ives was established as a separate Parish by Cardinal Gilroy in 1958 when he appointed Fr Peter Sheil as first Parish Priest.

This year marks the 70th anniversary of our parish hall, which was our original Church at St Ives.


22 OCTOBER 2023

Social Justice Corner

Laudate Deum

Pope Francis has released his new <u>Laudate Deum</u>, where he revisits the issues relating to the human response to climate change he raised in Laudato Si. Where Laudato Si was more general in its language, Laudate Deum is much more specific about climate targets and what needs to be done in the short term.

In his introduction, Pope Francis notes: "Eight years have passed since I published the Encyclical Letter Laudato Si', when I wanted to share with all of you, my brothers and sisters of our suffering planet, my heartfelt concerns about the care of our common home. Yet, with the passage of time, I have realized that our responses have not been adequate, while the world in which we live is collapsing and may be nearing the breaking point. In addition to this possibility, it is indubitable that the impact of climate change will increasingly prejudice the lives and families of many persons. We will feel its effects in the areas of healthcare, sources of employment, access to resources, housing, forced migrations, etc.....This is a global social issue and one intimately related to the dignity of human life."

Voice to Parliament

The Australian Catholic Bishops Conference has issued two new documents leading up to the Referendum:

A <u>supplementary statement</u> from the bishops themselves, titled *Towards The Referendum*. A <u>referendum factsheet</u> compiled by the bishops' Office of Justice, Ecology and Peace. The factsheet includes pastoral statements from several bishops.





First Reading

From the prophet Isaiah Is 5:1-7

The vineyard of the Lord God of hosts is the House of Israel.

Let me sing to my friend the song of his love for his vineyard. My friend had a vineyard on a fertile hillside. He dug the soil, cleared it of stones, and planted choice vines in it. In the middle he built a tower, he dug a press there too. He expected it to yield grapes, but sour grapes were all that it gave. And now, inhabitants of Jerusalem and men of Judah, I ask you to judge between my vineyard and me.

What could I have done for my vineyard that I have not done? I expected it to yield grapes. Why did it yield sour grapes instead? Very well, I will tell you what I am going to do to my vineyard: I will take away its hedge for it to be grazed on, and knock down its wall for it to be trampled on. I will lay it waste, unpruned, undug; overgrown by the briar and the thorn. I will command the clouds to rain no rain on it. Yes, the vineyard of the Lord of hosts is the House of Israel, and the men of Judah that chosen plant. He expected justice, but found bloodshed, integrity, but only a cry of distress. The Word of the Lord.

Responsorial Psalm Ps 79:9. 12-16. 19-20. R. Is 5:7

(R.) The vineyard of the Lord is the House of Israel.

- 1. You brought a vine out of Egypt; to plant it you drove out the nations. It stretched out its branches to the sea, to the Great River it stretched out its shoots. (R.)
- 2. Then why have you broken down its walls? It is plucked by all who pass by. It is ravaged by the boar of the forest, devoured by the beasts of the field. (R.)
- 3. God of hosts, turn again, we implore, look down from heaven and see. Visit this vine and protect it, the vine your right hand has planted. (R.)
- 4. And we shall never forsake you again: give us life that we may call upon your name. God of hosts, bring us back; let your face shine on us and we shall be saved. (R.)

Second Reading

From the letter of St Paul to the Philippians Phil 4:6-9 Do these things and the God of peace will be with you. There is no need to worry; but if there is anything you need, pray for it, asking God for it with prayer and thanksgiving, and that peace of God, which is so much greater than we can understand, will guard your hearts and your thoughts, in Christ Jesus.

Finally, brothers, fill your minds with everything that is true, everything that is noble, everything that is good and pure, everything that we love and honour, and everything that can be thought virtuous or worthy of praise. Keep doing all the things that you learnt from me and have been taught by me and have heard or seen that I do. Then the God of peace will be with you.

Gospel

From the holy Gospel according to Matthew Mt 21:33-43

He leased his vineyard to other farmers.

Jesus said to the chief priests and the elders of the people, 'Listen to another parable. There was a man, a landowner, who planted a vineyard; he fenced it round, dug a winepress in it and built a tower; then he leased it to tenants and went abroad. When vintage time drew near he sent his servants to the tenants to collect his produce. But the tenants seized his servants, thrashed one, killed another and stoned a third. Next he sent some more servants, this time a larger number, and they dealt with them in the same way. Finally he sent his son to them. "They will respect my son," he said. But when the tenants saw the son, they said to each other, "This is the heir. Come on, let us kill him and take over his inheritance." So they seized him and threw him out of the vineyard and killed him. Now when the owner of the vineyard comes, what will he do to those tenants?' They answered, 'He will bring those wretches to a wretched end and lease the vineyard to other tenants who will deliver the produce to him when the season arrives.' Jesus said to them, 'Have you never read in the scriptures:

It was the stone rejected by the builders that became the keystone.
This was the Lord's doing and it is wonderful to see?
'I tell you, then, that the kingdom of God will be taken from you and given to a people who will produce its fruit.'
